

NEW BUILDING NOW OPEN

Campbelltown Hospital is located on the land of the Dharawal people. Our new hospital building features a Welcome Stone, Sensory Stone and Healing Circle, which have been selected and designed in consultation and collaboration with local Aboriginal Elders and community members. Acknowledging the Cumberland Plains that the hospital is built on, these stones welcome, connect and celebrate our community.

The NSW Government has invested more than \$632 million in the Stage 2 redevelopment of Campbelltown Hospital, providing a major expansion and upgrade of essential health services for the Macarthur community.

Thank you to our local Aboriginal Elders and community members who shared their cultural knowledge to help shape the new hospital building.



The hospital's Uncle Ivan Lounge has moved to Level 2 of the new hospital building. This room is a space where patients, families and friends of the Aboriginal community can come together in a culturally safe place and have a yarn, reflect, connect, or, if they need to grieve.

The Welcome Stone is located near the front entry and features Indigenous language inviting you on to Dharawal Country.

The Sensory Stone has engraved handprints of local Elders that you can touch on your way through to the hospital.

The Healing Circle is a dedicated outdoor space where people can go to reflect, rewind and reconnect with nature.

The ceremony of giving thanks to our grandfather sun made the orientation of the healing circle of upmost importance –ensuring the circle captures the sunrise to the east and the sunset to the west. With specific trees and stones selected, the space acknowledges the connection between Campbelltown Hospital and Dharawal Country, recognising more than 60,000 years of Aboriginal culture in the region.
